PLAY'S INTRODUCTION

NARRATOR The Mueller Report - The Play: 10 Acts of Obstruction

This play is a translation of Mueller's Report Volume II Obstruction of Justice evidence. Mueller's evidence is based on sworn testimonies, documents, recordings and other objective evidence.

The play directly translates the evidence descriptions into active dialogue. One can almost follow the Mueller report paragraph by paragraph throughout the play.

NARRATOR (cont'd)

Act 8

To provide background for Act 8 here are some relevant scenes from Act 4:

June 14, 2017 - The first public report that Trump himself is under investigation by the Special Counsel's Office

PRESS

(Washington Post) The Special Counsel is investigating whether Trump has attempted to obstruct justice. The Special Counsel is interviewing intelligence community leaders, including Coats and Rogers, about what Trump has asked them to do in response to Comey's March 20, 2017 testimony. This inquiry into obstruction marks "a major turning point" in the investigation. PRESS (cont'd)

While Trump has received private assurances from then-FBI Director James B. Comey starting in January that he was not personally under investigation, officials say that changed shortly after Comey's firing.

PRESS (cont'd) (another press person - Cable news networks) The Washington Post is reporting that Special Counsel is investigating whether Trump has attempted to obstruct justice.

NARRATOR That evening, at approximately 10:31 p.m Trump calls McGahn

TRUMP AND MCGAHN ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

TRUMP

What about this reporting that I am under investigation?

MCGAHN

You are calling my personal cell phone?

(Talking continues)

NARRATOR

The conversation lasted for about 15 minutes.

Early the next day, June 15, 2017 Trump makes three separate tweets

TRUMP TWEETING STEPS FORWARD (Three separate tweets)

TRUMP

They made up a phony collusion with the Russians story, found zero proof, so now they go for obstruction of justice on the phony story. Nice" TRUMP (cont'd) You are witnessing the single greatest WITCH HUNT in American political history-led by some very bad and conflicted people!

TRUMP (cont'd)

Crooked H destroyed phones w/ hammer, 'bleached' emails, & had husband meet w/AG days before she was cleared- & they talk about obstruction?"

NARRATOR June 16, 2017 Trump makes two separate tweets

TRUMP TWEETING STEPS FORWARD (Two separate tweets)

TRUMP

After 7 months of investigations & committee hearings about my 'collusion with the Russians,' nobody has been able to show any proof. Sad!

TRUMP (cont'd)

I am being investigated for firing the FBI Director by the man who told me to fire the FBI Director! Witch Hunt.

NARRATOR

June 17, 2017 Trump calls McGahn

TRUMP AND MCGAHN ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

TRUMP

Remove the Special Counsel! Call Rosenstein and say that Mueller has conflicts that precludes him from serving as Special Counsel. You gotta do this. You gotta call Rod.

MCGAHN

I will see what I can do.

MCGAHN (cont'd) (after call, to himself) This call is unsettling. I do not intend to act on the request. (MORE)

MCGAHN (cont'd)

Other advisers and I believe the asserted conflicts are "silly" and "not real," and we have previously communicated that view to Trump. I have also made clear to Trump that the White House Counsel's Office should not be involved in any effort to press the issue of conflicts. I am concerned about having any role in asking the Acting Attorney General to fire the Special Counsel because coming from the Reagan era, I want to be more like Judge Robert Bork and not "Saturday Night Massacre Bork." I believe that Trump's request is an inflection point and I want to hit the brakes.

NARRATOR

Trump calls McGahn again

TRUMP

(on second call to McGahn)

I mean it. Remove the Special Counsel! Call Rod, tell Rod that Mueller has conflicts and can't be the Special Counsel.

MCGAHN

I understand. Okay.

MCGAHN (cont'd) (after call, to himself) I just wanted to get off the phone. I am worn down. He has the impression that I am going to do it. I feel trapped. I do not know what I will say the next time Trump calls. I must resign.

NARRATOR McGahn calls his personal attorney

MCGAHN AND PERSONAL ATTORNEY ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN

I am resigning.

NARRATOR Then he calls his chief of staff, Annie Donaldson

MCGAHN AND HIS CHIEF OF STAFF, ANNIE DONALDSON ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN

I am resigning.

NARRATOR

McGahn then drove to his office to pack his belongings and submit his resignation letter. Here he talks to Annie Donaldson, his Chief of Staff

MCGAHN AND DONALDSON STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN

Trump has called and demands that I contact the Department of Justice. Trump wants me to do something that I do not want to do. Trump has called at least twice more and in one of the calls has asked "have you done it?"

MCGAHN (cont'd)

(to himself)

I don't want to tell Donaldson the specifics of Trump's request because I am consciously trying not to involve her in the investigation.

DONALDSON

(to self) Trump's directive must be related to the Russia investigation. I will prepare to resign along with McGahn.

NARRATOR

That evening McGahn calls Priebus and Bannon separately

MCGAHN, PRIEBUS AND BANNON ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN (Separate call to Priebus) I intend to resign. Trump has asked me to do crazy shit. PRIEBUS No. Please don't quit.

MCGAHN

(to himself) I am not going to share details of Trump's request with other White House staff.

PRIEBUS

(to himself) McGahn does not tell me the specifics of Trump's request because McGahn is trying to protect me from what I do not need to know.

MCGAHN (Separate call to Bannon) I intend to resign. Trump has asked me to do crazy shit.

BANNON No. Please don't quit.

NARRATOR

McGahn ultimately returned to work that Monday and remained in his position. He had not told Trump directly that he planned to resign, and when they next saw each other Trump did not ask McGahn whether he had followed through with calling Rosenstein.

Now to continue Act 8 for Obstruction I.

Obstruction I. in Mueller Report Volume II page 113: Trump Orders McGahn to Deny that Trump Tried to Fire the Special Counsel.

The first evidence of Obstruction I is the Press Reports that Trump Tried to Fire the Special Counsel

NARRATOR (cont'd)

January 25, 2018 - Press reports six months after the actual act occurred

PRESS

(The New York Times) In June 2017, Trump had ordered McGahn to have the Department of Justice fire the Special Counsel.

After receiving Trump's order to fire Special Counsel Mueller, the White House counsel Don McGahn refused to ask the Justice Department to dismiss Mueller, saying he would quit instead. Trump "ultimately backed down after McGahn threatened to resign rather than carry out the directive.

NARRATOR

Also, amid the first wave of news media reports that Mueller was examining a possible obstruction case, Trump began to argue that Mueller had three conflicts of interest that disqualified him from overseeing the investigation. Trump also publicly stated ...

TRUMP AND PRESS STEP FORWARD

TRUMP

Fake news, folks. Fake news. A typical New York Times fake story.

NARRATOR

The next day Washington Post reported on the same event and added

PRESS

McGahn had not told Trump directly that he intended to resign rather than carry out the directive to have the Special Counsel terminated.

NARRATOR Evidence #2. Trump Seeks to Have

McGahn Dispute the Press Reports

NARRATOR (cont'd)

January 26, 2018 Trump's personal attorney calls McGahn's attorney

TRUMP'S PERSONAL COUNSEL AND MCGAHN'S ATTORNEY ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

TRUMP'S PERSONAL COUNSEL Trump wants McGahn to put out a statement denying that he had been asked to fire the Special Counsel and that he had threatened to quit in protest.

NARRATOR After call McGahn's attorney tells McGahn ...

MCGAHN'S ATTORNEY AND MCGAHN STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN'S ATTORNEY This is what has been requested by Trump's personal attorney.

NARRATOR McGahn's Attorney responds to Trump's personal attorney

MCGAHN'S ATTORNEY AND TRUMP'S PERSONAL ATTORNEY STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN'S ATTORNEY McGahn will not make a statement. The Times story is accurate in reporting that Trump wanted the Special Counsel removed. Although the article is inaccurate in some other respects, McGahn cannot comply with Trump's request to dispute the story.

NARRATOR White House Communications Director Hope Hicks talks to Trump

HICKS AND TRUMP STEP FORWARD

HICKS One of your attorneys has spoken to McGahn's attorney about requesting McGahn's denial. NARRATOR

January 26, 2018 - Trump talks to Press Secretary Sarah Hucklebee Sanders

TRUMP AND SANDERS STEP FORWARD

TRUMP Contact McGahn about the story.

NARRATOR later Sanders talks to McGahn

SANDERS AND MCGAHN STEP FORWARD

SANDERS Trump wants you to respond to the Times story.

MCGAHN There is no need to respond. Some of the article is accurate.

MCGAHN (cont'd) (to himself) I see no reason to correct the Times story.

NARRATOR February 4, 2018 Priebus goes on Meet the Press TV show

PRIEBUS AND MEET THE PRESS HOST STEP FORWARD

PRIEBUS I have never heard that the President wants the Special Counsel fired.

NARRATOR After Priebus's appearance, Priebus talks to Trump

TRUMP AND PRIEBUS ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

TRUMP You did a great job on Meet the Press. I have never said any of those things about the Special Counsel.

NARRATOR

The next day, on February 5, 2018 Trump and White House Staff Secretary Robert Porter discuss the situation

TRUMP AND PORTER STEP FORWARD

TRUMP

The Times article is bullshit. I have not sought to terminate the Special Counsel. McGahn leaked it to the media to make himself look good. Tell McGahn to create a record to make clear that I never directed McGahn to fire the Special Counsel.

PORTER

Shouldn't this matter be handled by the White House communications office?

TRUMP

I want McGahn to write a letter to the file "for our records. I want something beyond a press statement to demonstrate that the reporting is inaccurate. McGahn is a lying bastard. I want a record from him. If he doesn't write a letter, then maybe I'll have to get rid of him.

NARRATOR

Later that day Porter talks to McGahn

PORTER AND MCGAHN STEP FORWARD

PORTER

Trump says you have to write a letter to dispute that you were ever ordered to terminate the Special Counsel.

MCGAHN

The media reports are true. Trump was insistent on firing the Special Counsel and I did plan to resign rather than carry out the order, although I did not personally tell Trump I intended to quit.

PORTER

Trump suggested that you will be fired if you do not write the letter.

MCGAHN

The optics will be terrible if Trump followed through with firing me on that basis. I will not write the letter Trump requests.

NARRATOR Then Porter talks to Kelly

PORTER AND KELLY STEP FORWARD

PORTER

This is what was said in my conversation with McGahn...

NARRATOR

The next day, on February 6, 2018 Kelly schedules a meeting with McGahn to meet with him and Trump in the Oval Office to discuss the Times article.

The morning of the meeting, Trump's personal attorney called McGahn's attorney to say that Trump is going to be speaking with McGahn and McGahn cannot resign no matter what happens in the meeting.

The Oval Office meeting begins. Trump, White House Chief of Staff John Kelly and McGahn attending

TRUMP, KELLY, AND MCGAHN STEP FORWARD

TRUMP

(To McGahn) The New York Times story does not look good. You need to correct it. I never said to fire Mueller. I never said 'fire.' This story doesn't look good. You need to correct this. You're the White House counsel. I acknowledged that I did not tell you directly that I planned to resign, but the story is otherwise accurate.

TRUMP

Did I say the word 'fire'?"

MCGAHN

What you said is, 'Call Rod Rosenstein, tell Rod that Mueller has conflicts and can't be the Special Counsel.'

TRUMP

I never said that. I merely wanted you to raise the conflicts issue with Rosenstein and leave it to him to decide what to do.

MCGAHN

I did not understand the conversation that way. Instead I heard, "Call Rod. There are conflicts. Mueller has to go."

TRUMP

Will you do a correction?

MCGAHN

No.

MCGAHN (cont'd) (to himself) Trump is testing my mettle to see how committed I am to what happened.

KELLY

(to himself) The meeting is a little tense.

TRUMP

Why did you tell Special Counsel's Office investigators that I had told you to have the Special Counsel removed?

MCGAHN

I had to. My conversations with you are not protected by attorney-client privilege.

TRUMP

What-about these notes? Why do you take notes? Lawyers don't take notes. I never had a lawyer who took notes.

MCGAHN

I keep notes because I am a real lawyer. The notes create a record and are not a bad thing.

TRUMP I've had a lot of great lawyers, like Roy Cohn. He did not take notes.

NARRATOR After the Oval Office meeting concluded McGahn and Kelly talk

MCGAHN AND KELLY STEP FORWARD

MCGAHN

Trump and I did have that conversation about removing the Special Counsel.

KELLY

I have pointed out to Trump after our Oval Office meeting that you had not backed down and will not budge.

NARRATOR Following the Oval Office meeting Trump's personal attorney calls McGahn's attorney.

TRUMP'S PERSONAL COUNSEL AND MCGAHN'S COUNSEL ON PHONES STEP FORWARD

TRUMP'S PERSONAL COUNSEL Trump is fine with McGahn.

NARRATOR

NARRATOR (cont'd)

Pages 118 to 120 of Volume II of the Mueller report outlines the relevance of the evidence presented in Act 8 to the elements of the case for obstruction of justice. The analysis includes the principles of an Obstructive Act, Nexus to a proceeding, and Intent. The audience is encouraged to review that analysis.

The report states that substantial evidence indicates that in Trump's repeatedly urging of McGahn to dispute that he was ordered to have the Special Counsel Mueller terminated, the President acted for the purpose of influencing McGahn's account in order to deflect or prevent further scrutiny of the President's conduct towards the investigation.

Several facts support that conclusion. The President made repeated attempts to get McGahn to change his story. As described above, by the time of the last attempt, the evidence suggests that the President had been told on multiple occasions that McGahn believed the President had ordered him to have the Special Counsel terminated. McGahn interpreted his encounter with the President in the Oval Office as an attempt to test his mettle and see how committed he was to his memory of what had occurred. The President had already laid the groundwork for pressing McGahn to alter his account by telling Porter that it might be necessary to fire McGahn if he did not deny the story, and Porter relayed that statement to McGahn.

NARRATOR (cont'd)

Additional evidence of the President's intent may be gleaned from the fact that his counsel was sufficiently alarmed by the prospect of the President's meeting with McGahn that he called McGahn's counsel and said that McGahn could not resign no matter what happened in the Oval Office that day. The President's counsel was well aware of McGahn's resolve not to issue what he believed to be a false account of events despite the President's request.

Finally, as noted above, Trump brought up the Special Counsel investigation in his Oval Office meeting with McGahn and criticized him for telling the Special Counsel about the June 17, 2017 events. The President's statements reflect his understanding-and his displeasurethat those events would be part of an obstruction-of-justice inquiry.
